"WE HAVE COME TO DO HIM HOMAGE"



The Sacred Seasons and Feasts of the Church's Calendar are not a matter of nostalgia, make-believe or liturgical dramatisation. There is always the Grace of Season and a message relevant to our particular time. Bearing this in mind I believe that this Christmas we should cast our minds back to the theme of World Youth Day in Cologne last August, **'We have come to do Him homage'**. Pope Benedict's homily to a million young people focused on a special journey - that pilgrimage made in faith and goodwill, recorded in the Gospel, that we know as the journey of the three Magi. They were motivated by a desire for a better world - to seek out the special King, foretold in Scripture, who would, acting in God's Name, transform the world. Astonishingly for them they found themselves in the presence of the Infant Child in a stable, in whose presence they went down on their knees and did him homage. Pope Benedict said that the journey typifies our own pilgrimage of faith.

The Pope went on to say **"Dear friends, this is not a distant story that took place long ago. It is with us now. Here in the Eucharist he is present before us and in our midst.**

As at that time, so now he is mysteriously veiled in a sacred silence; as at that time, it is here that the true face of God is revealed. For us he became a grain of wheat that falls on the ground and dies and bears fruit until the end of the world (cf. Jn 12:24.) He is present now as he was then in Bethlehem. He invites us to that inner pilgrimage which is called adoration. Let us set off on this pilgrimage of the spirit and let us ask him to be our guide."

In an age sickened by wanton killing, threats of terrorism, and the

inherent violence of capital punishment so much in the news of late, Christmas reminds us in 2005 of the significance of the **Word becoming Flesh and dwelling amongst us.** We are reassured of the God-given dignity and destiny of every human being. In the words of the late Pope John Paul in anticipation of World Youth Day: "Who could have invented a greater sign of love? We are left in awe before *the mystery of a God who lowered himself* to take on our human condition, to the point of giving His life for us on the Cross." Through the celebration of Christmas we are reminded anew that "Christ is in search of every human being, whatever the situation." (Pope John Paul.)

May this be for us all and the world, a season of renewed hope, a greater awareness of the dignity of each person, and of deep peace.

Prayer of Pope John Paul:

Let us contemplate with Mary the poverty of the stable, the 'event' of the incarnation: **God becomes man to meet each of us.** Let us allow this great mystery to transform our lives. Let us open wide our hearts to Jesus, the Door of Life.

JAMES HENRY MURPHY (HARRY) 1916 - 2005

Harry Murphy, a life long parishioner of St Michael's, died on September 28th. Harry was one of the sons of the Shoalhaven to experience the suffering and cruelty of war, having been imprisoned in the infamous Changi prison in February 1942.

Born at Numbaa to James Lawrence and Melinda Margaret Murphy, their second son and fifth child, he spent his early childhood living with his family at "Riverview Farm" until he went to boarding school at St Joseph's, Hunters Hill. During his school days he watched the Sydney Harbour Bridge being built from his dormitory window and saw those great arches meet. Upon completion of his education he returned to work on the family farm under the watchful eye of his Uncle Tim. Harry was an excellent sportsman and enjoyed playing both disciplines of rugby, representing Pyree in the local competition. He was also an active participant in the 7th Light Horse in Nowra.

Harry joined the army in December 1940 and went to Singapore with No 2 Company AASC where he was captured



in February 1942 with the fall of Singapore. During confinement in the POW Camp at Changi, he was assigned to the prisoners 'F' Force which was taken by railway cattle trucks to Ban Pong, in Thailand. From there they were marched 293km into the jungle to an area above Nikki where they built the camps of Kami Songkurai and Shimo Songkurai and worked on building the infamous Burma railway until completion. Once the line was finished the Japanese moved the surviving prisoners back to Changi by train. Harry

arrived back in very poor health and was diagnosed with Beri-beri, which reduced his weight from eleven stone to just six stone. He was discharged in December 1945 and returned to Nowra where he became a founding member of the Shoalhaven Ex-Servicemen's Club when it was formed in February 1948. Harry married Marjorie Edith Smith at St Michael's Church, Nowra on 13th August 1949. They lived in Nowra from their marriage in 1949 until 1953 when they moved to the Riverina where Harry spent 10 years working on properties around Wagga Wagga and Cootamundra before returning to settle permanently in Plunkett Street, Nowra. Harry worked at the APPM from 1963 until his retirement in March 1976. Harry and Marj had five children, Jeffory, Wendy, Judith (deceased), Jill, and Sally. Marj died in March 1998.

One of his great loves in the latter part of his life was golf. Harry was a faithful devotee of the Anzac Day Mass at St Michael's over the years and was fittingly farewelled from the Church of his baptism with Requiem Mass and the customary RSL service on 6th October 2005. *May he rest in peace.*

WORLD YOUTH DAY! *"WE HAVE COME TO WORSHIP HIM"*



The above quote was the motto of the recent World Youth Day. The motto was set by the late pontiff, John Paul II, he said *"it is a theme that enables young people from every continent to follow in spirit, the path taken by the Magi"*. So on August 6th four students from St John the Evangelist, myself being one of them, joined 32 other pilgrims, and led by Fr David from Wollongong and Fr Tony from Maitland, started on a pilgrimage towards Cologne, Germany, for the 20th World Youth Day.

Our first destination was Paris. In the three days that we were there we visited the Eiffel Tower, L'Arc de Triomphe, the Champs Elysees and the Louvre - where we, like every other visitor, rushed to see the Mona Lisa. We celebrated Mass in the awesome Basilica of Sacre Coeur, in the magnificent Cathedral of Notre Dame, and with the Daughters of Charity in the Rue de Bac. This is the site where Our Lady appeared to Catherine Labouré and where her incorrupt body lies under the altar of Our Lady in the Chapel adjacent to the altar of St Vincent de Paul where his heart is enshrined.

From Paris we travelled on the TGV (fast train) to Lourdes where we spent two amazing days. Along with thousands of other pilgrims, we participated in the nightly candlelight procession, collected Holy Water from the Grotto where Our Lady appeared to Bernadette and celebrated Mass twice in one of the Chapels of the Basilica.

From Lourdes we moved north making a quick stop at the Palace of the Popes in the fortified city of Avignon before arriving at the quaint Monastery of La Salette near the summit of the Alps, where Our Lady appeared, crying, to the children, Melanie and Maximus. The following day we continued north and that night, joined in praising the Lord through music and chants at Taize. After staying the night with the

Sisters of St Marie at Paray Le Monial where we made our way to the sixth smallest country, Luxembourg, where we were joined by Bishop Peter, and where we were able to rest and prepare ourselves spiritually and physically for the coming action-packed week in Cologne.

While in Cologne we were fortunate enough to stay with host families during the week long celebration. Highlights of the week, would have to be the Aussie Gathering, the whole 2500 of us; the Catechesis; our very cramped visit to Cologne Cathedral; waiting eight long hours on the banks of the Rhine River for Pope Benedict to arrive and of course the big sleep out under the stars with a million other young people from all over the world, and the big event, Sunday Mass with the Pope - a truly wonderful event that went for three hours as the Pope spoke in five or so different languages.

Before coming home we had a two day retreat in Haltern, where we were able to look back at the incredible time we had had and reflect on experiences that we will never forget.

World Youth Days are very important. They ensure that God's Word is getting through to the youth and it is also important that those who attend tell others of the experience. With the announcement that Sydney will host the 2008 World Youth Day, World Youth Day offers the unique opportunity to meet, share and celebrate your faith with hundreds of thousands of people from all over the world. To be surrounded by so many people who share the same faith as you and who are so willing to celebrate it, is wonderful. It is an experience that should not be missed and is proof that the youth of today still have a very strong relationship with God and their faith.

In a recent newsletter, Father David wrote - "in a sense - it was not we who decided to go to World Youth Day, but God who called us from among all others to make the journey". As Jesus says in the Gospels "You did not choose me, no I chose you". However, having said that, I realise that this trip would not have been possible without the generous support of the Parish - and on behalf of Shaun, Tessa and Madeleine, I would like to sincerely thank Father Pat and the Parish Pastoral Council for giving us this amazing opportunity. As Father David said in Haltern, "Because of our journey to World Youth Day, we, like the Wise Men who returned home on a different road, have returned home with a new perspective on life, our faith and on our understanding of the Church, our world and ourselves".

"UNIVERSAL NATURE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH"

In September I embarked on a two-month journey abroad to visit children's museums as part of a Churchill Fellowship. Travelling with my daughter Hannah Grace, we found that one of the more uplifting aspects was to experience the universal nature of the Catholic Church and the magnificent art and architecture of some of the world's great houses of worship.

In the USA, we went to Mass in St Brigid's Church in Amherst, Massachusetts and later, St Patrick's Cathedral in New York. In France, it was Sacre Coeur at Montmartre on Sunday and then the famous Notre Dame Cathedral in the heart of Paris the next. In Germany, we celebrated Mass at St Michael's Benedictine Monastery, set high on a hill in Sieburg and then the following week we went to Cologne Cathedral. Cologne was the venue for the 20th World Youth Day in August this year.

Of course, in the US, we could understand all that was being said - but in France and Germany, we only had a rudimentary grasp of the languages. We, therefore, relied on our memory of the rhythm of Mass to participate with appropriate gestures.

However, when we felt confident of the response, we did so in English - especially in saying The Lord's Prayer. There was one occasion though, that I now look back on with amusement, on which I uttered "and also with you" when the response should have been "Blessed be God forever". But somehow, I don't think anybody would have been concerned.

Besides the beauty of the buildings and their artistic adornments - especially the one in Cologne, which took 600 years to build (they ran out of money half way through) - the music, for me, was the highlight. From Massachusetts to Cologne it broke through all language barriers and enveloped all present. But it was in Notre Dame that we were really transported to new heights with the full choir at the 11 am Sunday Mass. A world class musical event that I highly recommend for anyone visiting Paris.

FAREWELL ANNE ROUEN!!

Anne Rouen, or as she became known to the Community, Miss Rouen, started work in the office at St Michael's in February 1981, nearly 25 years ago!! In fact, this has only been Anne's second job in her working life. During that time, there have been many significant changes at the School - new buildings, new principals, including the first lay principal, Mr Tubridy, and of course, hundreds of new children and their parents.

For many, Miss Rouen, was the fount of knowledge - an absolute "how-to" whether it be bus passes, bus buddies, uniform issues or "what to do because I've missed the bus."

Miss Rouen was very firm with everyone. The kids loved to be terrified of her and despite the bark, everyone knew that behind it there is a very compassionate soul who cared greatly for the School and all within - children, parents and staff.

As in most places where CaFE is run, our discussion tables of the weekly



The video presentations were greatly enhanced by the use of the newly acquired video projector which seemed to bring the presenter, David Payne, right into the room with us. Thanks to Sr Val and helpers, the discussion tables were tastefully

prepared and simple refreshments provided.

Considerable interest was raised in the programme by its earlier presentation in Nowra. Very positive comments filtering back meant that the style and something of its content became widely known and so it needed very little 'selling'. Participants finished our programme looking forward to the next module, tentatively scheduled to begin after Pentecost in 2006. There is undoubtedly a growing appreciation of the need for formation in our faith. Participants seemed very thankful that this need had been met in such an accessible and enjoyable way.

LIVING THE LITURGY.



In July more than 500 people from around the Diocese of Wollongong attended a Liturgy Conference which featured animated and inspiring American Capuchin priest Fr Ed Foley as the guest speaker. Around 30 parishioners from Nowra also attended the Conference, and asked about following up the Conference with a session that might keep the spirit alive.

In response an evening session was organised with a presentation by Sr Eileen Brown sgs and Richard Healey, which featured music, audio extracts from the talks by Fr Ed, along with a PowerPoint presentation and opportunities to share and reflect upon the impact of the material. Fr Ed

covered a whole range of material in his insightful talks on "Eucharist as Mystagogy," a term that means "initiation into the mysteries of the faith." Many people have remarked how the Eucharist is now a much more prayer-*full* and meaning-*full* experience. The Mass is beginning to bring about its second consecration - not just in the bread and wine - but also in us, the Christian Assembly.

We are a Church on a mission, as ministers of holy communion and acolytes reflected on in a recent

formation evening. This mission is shared in no better way than when ministers of care go forth from the Sunday Eucharist to share Jesus with the sick and the house-bound in two forms: the Eucharistic bread and the presence of the body of Christ that each one of us brings and shares when we go forth in Jesus' name. As a parish community, we thank God for the precious gift of these faithful ministers who bring the presence of Jesus to those who cannot share with us in church, and the gift of those who have expressed an interest in undertaking this ministry in the months ahead.


